

A Mindset

The Beatitudes praise the poor in spirit. One characteristic of those who are poor in spirit is their ability to ask for help; they know when others can provide what they lack. Today's readings encourage us to practice poverty in spirit by asking God for what we need. What could be more

natural than to ask God for good things? God is, after all, the inventor of goodness and the giver of all good things.

Asking God for help puts us in conversation with God. These conversations take many forms. The reading from Genesis shows Abraham bantering with God like a skilled negotiator, while Saint Paul's letter to the Colossians praises God for answering us even when we don't deserve it. In Saint Luke's Gospel, Jesus not only gives us words to use in our conversations with God (the Our Father), but also promises that God always listens to our prayers.

Life of Stewardship

In our Gospel reading from Luke, some disciples of Jesus ask our Lord to teach them how to pray. Jesus instantly offers them the beautiful prayer which we, of course, know as the *Our Father*.

The *Our Father* truly is the ultimate steward's prayer. In it, we call upon God in an intimate way, as Father. We ask that His will

be done (not ours!) and that His kingdom come (not ours!). In other words, we remember that He is our Creator, everything is His, and our focus in life should be on His priorities, not our own. Then we ask Him to supply our needs (to give our daily bread), forgive our sins, and protect us from evil. That is, we proclaim our complete trust in His provision for us and mercy towards us. We, too, commit to extending mercy ourselves (as we forgive those who sin against us).



As we pray the words of the *Our Father*, we recognize this

basic truth about ourselves and God: God is our Father and we are beloved and infinitely blessed to be His children. This is the basis of a stewardship way of life.

At the end of the Gospel passage, Jesus encourages us to pursue a relationship with the Father: Ask Him, seek Him, knock on His door!

He can hardly wait to bless us, His children. Remember that this week, then go, be a blessing to others! Stewardship is just that simple.

Catholic Social Justice

Being a believer means that one lives a certain way -walking with the Lord, doing justice, loving kindness, living peaceably among all people. Christian discipleship means practicing what Jesus preached. Discipleship is found in a relationship with Christ and a commitment to His mission of "bringing good news to the poor, liberty to captives, new sight to the blind and setting the downtrodden free."

For Catholics, this takes on special meaning today. According to the Second Vatican Council, "It is the special vocation of the laity to seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and directing them according to God's will. They live in the world, in each and every one of the world's occupations and callings and in the ordinary circumstances of social and family life which, as it were, form the context of their existence. There they are called by God to contribute to the sanctification of the world within, like leaven, in the spirit of the Gospel, by fulfilling their own particular duties."

We welcome and affirm the growing participation of lay women and men in the internal life of the Church. Service within the Church should form and strengthen believers for their mission in the world. With this pastoral statement we are addressing in a special way the demands of discipleship in the pursuit of justice and peace in everyday activity.

Followers of the Lord Jesus live their discipleship as spouses and parents, single adults and youth, employers and employees, consumers and investors, citizens and neighbors. We renew the warning of the Second Vatican Council that the "split between the faith which many profess and their daily lives deserves to be counted among the more serious errors of our age." ⁵ By our Baptism and Confirmation every member of our community is called to live his or her faith in the world.

Catholic Update

Treasures From Our Tradition

The pilgrim experience of going by foot to Santiago de Compostella, the shrine of St. James, reached its high point this week at the feast of the Apostle, with tens of thousands of pilgrims on the road. Typically, they cover twelve to twenty miles a day through rough territory. The difficult journey and the often-primitive lodging facilities are made bearable by the joy of the pilgrims, their songs and prayers. When their journey is documented properly, they receive the scallop shell, a reminder not only of James the fisherman, but also his call to fish for human beings and to baptize the nations. In the Middle Ages, those who wore this badge on their hats were granted lodging and hospitality wherever they went. Next to the palm, the sign of a Jerusalem pilgrim, the scallop shell was most highly prized.

In the Middle Ages, some people so enjoyed the pilgrim road, although it was filled with discomfort and danger, that they spent most of their lives on the road. Today, some people take up the route for exercise, but are drawn gradually into the spirituality of the journey. As you make your summer travels, always fold in an element of pilgrimage: a long walk through beautiful countryside, a visit to a church, a prayer of gratitude for your journey through life's hills and valleys.

Did the Catholic Church add books to the Bible?

Yes, it did! We call those books...the New Testament! The Bible, as we have it today, did not exist for more than 350 years after the death of Jesus. Each of the individual books existed, but they were not all put together in the collection of books that we now refer to as "The Bible," until late in the 4th century A.D.

For more than 350 years after the death of Christ, there were disputes - among Christians - as to which books should be considered inspired Scripture. These disputes were about Old Testament and New Testament books. Revelation was a disputed book. As was Hebrews. As were 2 John and 3 John. As were James, Jude, and 2 Peter. Plus, there were many other books not in the New Testament as we have it now, which were considered inspired Scripture by various Christian communities around the world. These included the Letter of Clement to the Corinthians, the Didache, the Letter of Barnabas, the Acts of Peter, the Acts of Paul, the Acts of John, the Apocalypse of Peter, the Apocalypse of Paul, and several others.

So, if Christians were disputing over which books should and

shouldn't be considered the inspired Word of God, for more than 350 years after the death of Christ, then how did we end up with the Bible as we have it today? Who finally decided which books were and which books were not the inspired Word of God? Did Christians consult the Bible for the answer? Of course not! They went to the Church. But which church? The Catholic Church.

The Council of Rome, in 382 A.D., gave us the first list from the Church of which books should be considered inspired Scripture. That list had exactly the same 73 books of the Bible that are in the Catholic Bible today - including the 7 books of the Old Testament that Protestants refer to as the Apocrypha. That list of 73 books was affirmed by the Council of Hippo in 393 A.D., the Council of Carthage in 397 A.D., and in a letter from Pope Innocent I in 404 A.D.

All Christians, everywhere, considered the books of the "Apocrypha" to be inspired Scripture - as part of their Bible - until the 1500's, when Martin Luther removed them from the Bible. The Gutenberg Bible - the first book ever made with a printing press, had those 7 books in it. The Bible Martin Luther used as a Catholic priest, had those books in it. All Bibles everywhere had those books in them - no Bible had only 66 books - until the 1500's.

Saint of the Week—Ignatius of Loyola (1491—1556)

*Enduring influence

We read the lives of saints because they are a source of inspiration and encouragement. It was reading about them that completely changed Ignatius of Loyola's life. He became one of the greatest saints of the sixteenth century.

Ignatius had received a serious leg wound and back injury from cannon fire in battle, and spent time recovering from repeated surgeries in his family's castle. To fill the time, he read a Spanish translation by Goberto Vagad of *The Golden Legend*. These stories of great saints caught his attention, possibly because the saints' action based on faith resonated with the code of honor and chivalry that he had learned as a young knight. During his long convalescence, Iñigo López de Loyola began to think it would be a great honor to be a knight for the glory of God. He made up his mind to improve his behavior and to follow the example of the saints.

The cannon ball that broke his leg left him deformed and limping for the rest of his life. The first physician to set his broken leg did a poor job. It had to be broken again and reset. When he was able to walk again, he went to the Catalonian shrine of Our Lady at Montserrat. In the manner of knights in romantic talks, Ignatius spent the night there in a vigil. The next morning he exchanged his fine clothes for the sackcloth of a nearby pilgrim and placed his sword and dagger on the altar. The next day he began several months of solitude and meditation, experiencing mystical religious episodes.

The Gospel narratives of Christ fascinated Ignatius, inspiring him to make a pilgrimage to the sites mentioned in them. His desire to become a priest grew steadily, but he did not have the necessary education, so he began to study Latin and became a student at the University of Paris. He gathered a group of six friends on that campus into a new religious order, the beginnings of the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits. In 1540, the Jesuits received official recognition from Rome.

Ignatius of Loyola placed himself and his men at the service of the Church, declaring that they were ready to travel even to dangerous territory in order to promote Christianity. The list of martyrs becomes densely populated with Jesuits from this point on.

The Society of Jesus is but one of Ignatius of Loyola's great contributions to the world. Another is his Spiritual Exercises, a brilliant and inspired guide to spiritual formation. Countless Christians have used it to deepen their meditation and prayer. Four-week-long retreats continue to be offered following the design Ignatius conceived in 1533. Those who do not have a month available for such a retreat still profit from reading through his book. Thomas Merton said, "The Spiritual Exercises are very pedestrian and practical—their chief purpose being to enable all the busy Jesuits to get their minds off their work and back to God with a minimum of wasted time." Merton went on to say that he wished he had been able to go through the Exercises under Jesuit supervision, but did it on his own. He studied the rules that were in the book and followed them the best he could. "I never even breathed a word about what I was doing to any priest."

Ignatius writes, "In the same way that strolling, walking, and running exercise the body, spiritual exercise prepare the soul to become free of extravagant attachments and to discover what God wants to accomplish in one's life."

Ignatius of Loyola died suddenly on July 31, 1556. At the time of his death, there were about one thousand Jesuits. At the end of the twentieth century there were twenty-five thousand. Jesuits see their function as complementing rather than replacing the work of parish priests.

Amen.




