

Forgiveness

Nearly ten years before, a son and father had parted ways when the business they shared went bankrupt. The son blamed the father. They did not speak to each other again.

Then the father became seriously ill. The mother called the son and told him he had better come soon.

The son walked sheepishly into the hospital room. The father motioned his son to him and whispered: "Did you ever think you could do anything that would keep me from loving you?"

Resentment and anger are foul things, the first reading from Sirach tells us. Remember the last things. Stop hating. Live by the commandments. As St. Paul writes to the Romans, we are to live for the Lord and die for the Lord.

Jesus' parable in today's Gospel reminds us of God's compassion. The immense sin of humanity has been forgiven and stricken from the record. We are to forgive others in the same way.

Life of Stewardship

Today's readings call us to look inward to the state of our hearts, our thoughts and emotions.

Our first reading, from Sirach, addresses the complicated emotion of anger. "Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the Lord?" We have all been wounded by others at some point, some perhaps quite deeply. Our emotions are gifts from God. But we must steward them well, rather than allowing them to overcome us.

How do we do this? Sirach tells us. "Remember your last days, set enmity aside... Remember the Most High's covenant and overlook faults." We embrace the stewardship mindset — not brooding over hurts, but recalling all the gifts our good God has given us, all the love He continually pours out upon us, and we put our focus and trust in Him.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus reminds us of the true position we have before Him in light of all that He has done for us, comparing the kingdom of heaven to a "king who decided to settle accounts with his servants." In the parable, a debtor is brought before the king, owing such an overwhelming debt that it could not possibly be repaid. Yet, the king is filled with compassion for the servant, forgives the debt and lets him go free.

Doesn't that sound like each of us in relation to the King of Kings? The Father has given us life, and then sent His only Son to die for us to free us from our sin "debts" and make eternal life with Him possible for us. It is impossible for us to repay this debt. All we can do is thank God by giving Him our whole selves — inside and out.

What joy and freedom we find in the stewardship way of life!

With the start of the new school year, the staff at Holualoa School will be identifying families and students in need of help for the fall semester. In the past this evaluation takes up to a month, but this year due to the extraordinary need due to the pandemic, we will continue to provide help to those returning students and families. The school is basically closed and using on-line classes for all students except for special need students. The school cafeteria is providing drive by breakfast and lunch meals, but unfortunately many families are not able to take advantage of the program for various reasons such as lack of transportation, and other child/family member care needs. Malama Na Keiki will work with the school in the coming weeks to coordinate our resources with the needs of the students.

CVS Pharmacy has offered to do immunizations here at St Michael's. They will be offering this service on **September 29**, **2020 from 9-12 pm on the North Lanai (mauka side)**. The immunizations that will be offered are Flu shot, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis A/Hepatitis B Combo, Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis), Shingles vaccine and the Pneumonia vaccine. CVS will have forms available 2 weeks prior to September 29th to fill out to be submitted to your health insurance provider. Those without health insurance will be asked to pay for vaccinations at the time of service. **We will need a minimum of 24 immunizations in order to have this event happen.** If you are interested, please call the Office to sign up at 326-7771.

Catholic Update Vatican II FAQ's

6. Are Catholics free to ignore, disparage, or reject Vatican II?

No. In light of questions 1–5, this is not a valid option for Catholics. To ignore, disparage, or reject Vatican II is to call into question the living teaching authority of the Church itself, which was given by Christ (CCC 874) and is accomplished in the Holy Spirit (CCC 78). It is to place oneself in a dangerous spiritual attitude with respect to "the fullness of the means of salvation" (CCC 824)—the one, holy, Catholic, and apostolic Church—by setting oneself above its Magisterium as judge.

Pope St. Pius X warned against this attitude in 1909:

"Do not allow yourselves to be deceived by the cunning statements of those who persistently claim to wish to be with the Church, to love the Church, to fight so that people do not leave Her . . . but judge them by their works. If they despise the shepherds of the Church and even the Pope, if they attempt all means of evading their authority in order to elude their directives and judgments . . . then about which Church do these men mean to speak? Certainly not about that established on the foundations of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus Himself as the cornerstone."

Truth, Faith & Reason

We want to remind people why we are doing this series. Many people are living in fear, chaos, uncertainty due to death from the coronavirus pandemic, increasing number of violent deaths in many of our large cities, and against the 1,000 or more deaths per day of the unborn. We must remember we are in a spiritual battle with Principalities and powers (Ephesians 6:12). Fortunately, we as Catholics know that Jesus conquered death with the Resurrection.

We are living in a time similar to Elijah recounted in Romans 11:5 when St. Paul is referring to Elijah. Lord, they have slain your Prophets. They have overturned your altars. And I alone remain, and they are seeking my

But what is the Divine response to him? I have retained for myself seven thousand men, who have not bent their knees before Baal.

Therefore, in the same way, again in this

time, there is a remnant that has been saved in accord with the choice of grace.

In Matthew we get a glimpse of the defeat of death, and that God truly is in charge.

"And do not be afraid of those who kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul. But instead fear him who is able to destroy both body and soul." Are not two sparrows sold for one small coin? And yet not one of them will fall to the ground without your Father (Matthew 10: 28-29).

Do not think that I came to send peace on earth. I came, not to send peace, but the sword. For I came to divide a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother in law.

Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me. . . . And whoever does not take up his cross, and follow me is not worthy of me.

Whoever finds his life, will lose it. And whoever will have lost his live because of me, shall find it.

Jesus does not want us to fear death, or the turmoil in the Church.

In Matthew 14 as Jesus approaches the Barque of Peter (the Church) with the Apostles, and they are afraid. Immediately Jesus speaks to them, saying: "Have Faith. It is I. Do not be afraid (Matthew 14:27-33).

On approaching Caesarea Philippi, we hear the words of Jesus to the Apostles in Matthew 16. Caesarea Philippi was a center of pagan worship, including worship of Baal. Human sacrifices were a frequent occurrence, particularly of infants and children. Caesarea Philippi was considered a gateway to the underworld at the base of Mount Hermon.

Jesus is revealing His divinity to the Apostles in Matthew 16: 14-18. Jesus asks the Apostles, "But who do you say that I am" Simon Peter responded by saying, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." And I say to you, that you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it. Jesus is saying in Matthew 16 just as He says in Matthew 14, I will protect My church.

We get another glimpse of this from Saint Theresa of Lisieux (the little flower) who had many conversations with Jesus said St. Theresa says:

" Jesus has so incomprehensible a love for us that He wills that we have a share with Him in the salvation of souls. He wills to do nothing without us. The Creator of the universe awaits the prayer of a poor little soul to save other souls redeemed like it at the price of all His Blood."

Sir 27:30-28:7 | Rom 14:7-9 | Mt 18:21-35

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It's part of human nature to focus on the negative "headlines" on any given day. For example, after encountering a traffic delay due to a harmless fender bender on an otherwise uneventful commute, we are more likely to be upset and angry at the delay - and the people who caused it - rather than forgiving of the situation, and aware of the concurrent fact that we made it home safely! The author of the Book of Sirach seems to have this insight into humanity, for he describes wrath and anger as "hateful things, yet the sinner hugs them tight." I, too, have "hugged tight" to my anger at times over offenses real or perceived, and so I love the way Matthew's Gospel challenges us to not only let go of past hurts, but to forgive: forgive, forgive, forgive. It doesn't mean glossing over the human fender benders that can wreck relationships, but Jesus cautions us to prevent them from becoming the headlines of our lives. Instead, by opening our ears and our hearts to the Good News of God's forgiveness, we can, in turn, extend it to those who have hurt us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When Jesus taught his disciples how to pray the *Our Father* in an earlier verse in Matthew's Gospel, he used these words: "forgive us our debts, *as* we forgive our debtors." Not, "maybe I'll think about forgiving tomorrow," or "I might forgive *this* but I can't forgive *that*." Because when we open our hearts to the Good News of God's forgiveness, we must forgive "from the heart," as Jesus says at the end of today's passage. Is there someone in our lives whom we need to forgive? What's holding us back? Are we "holding tight" to our anger, or hurt, or resentment? Think about a relationship in your life that could use some healing. Perhaps a first step involves a phone call, a letter, an email, or an embrace. In prayer, ask for God's help; seek forgiveness and ask for the grace to forgive others.

ACTION Think of someone or something that has caused you to hang on to anger or resentment. Write a letter [you're not going to send it!] to that person, or to the "event," as if it were personified. Spell out factually what caused your anger. Then write that you forgive them. Put the pen down, pray that God would help you with the grace to truly forgive, then shred the letter. And let the anger go.



A Serious Business

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Sirach 27:30-28:7 Call to forgiveness and mercy
- ► Romans 14:7-9 To live and die for Christ
- ► Matthew 18:21-35 The merciless official

Jesus was an extraordinary teacher, but most of his teachings weren't "new" or "original;" he drew them from the wealth of his Jewish traditions and scripture. We see an example of this today in his teachings about forgiveness after reading from Sirach's instructions on the subject. Sirach wrote about 150-200 years before Jesus' time. On his part, Sirach based some of his teachings on wisdom from even earlier in Jewish history.

This is the second week in a row we read some of Jesus' teaching about the importance of forgiveness. Peter's question about how many times we must forgive someone else (seven times?) suggests that in their day people struggled with what some of us still struggle with todayforgiving others only to be repeatedly hurt and disappointed again. We get the sense that Peter may have thought he was generous in offering to forgive someone seven times. Jesus' answer, which can be translated either as "77 times" or "70 times seven times," would have been shocking—as it probably still is to us today. Surely the point isn't the exact number of times we forgive because if we are keeping count, we aren't entirely generous and free with our forgiveness. Jesus' point is not the number of times we forgive, but the "quality" of our forgiveness. If we imagine God keeping track of how many times we are forgiven, it will detract from the mercy. So if we want to be forgiven fully and freely, we are asked to do the same for others.



"Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?"

Sheepish Question:

Who have I failed to forgive? Why? Who has surprised me with mercy?

The parable about the merciless official which follows fleshes out the spirit of forgiveness that God displays and which Jesus asks us to reach for. The closing warning or threat of punishment for those who do not

forgive suggests how seriously
Jesus wants his listeners to
take this issue. We may not
like the image of a Father
God who will torture those
who are not merciful, but
it serves to wake us up to the
graveness of the issue at hand.

Questions of the Week

Are there situations or people whom you find easier to forgive, and whom you forgive repeatedly?

Reflect on an experience of struggling to forgive someone, perhaps for a very long time, but then finding the freedom to do so. How did it change you?

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

remember the Most High's covenant, and overlook faults.



Gospel MT 18:21-35

Peter approached Jesus and asked him,

Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened,

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they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair.

His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant!

I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to.

Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant,

as I had pity on you?'

Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt.

So will my heavenly Father do to you,

unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

Homily

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Profession of Faith:

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


