

to find it, is that faith is a process of more and more openness to God's direction of our lives. It is very hard for us to give up control, but perhaps what we are being asked to do is not to become passive and babyish, but to allow God to direct where our self-mastery will lead and what it will accomplish.

We are asked to relinquish the need to control the results of our efforts; to risk, as Jesus did, the loss of everything we are working to achieve. We are asked to let God take the lead and to control the results, even though we may never see those results.

It's All About Control

From toddlerhood to old age, we grow in mastery of our own lives, our bodies, and our destiny. This mastery is hard won, and we don't let go of autonomy easily. Much of this self-mastery involves the avoidance of pain or discomfort, so when we hear things like “take up your cross” and “lose your life,” we tend to resist the message.

James says that faith without works is dead. Ouch! That is really a direct message! One way to look at this, as well as the part about losing our life

Life of Stewardship

Jesus addresses His disciples saying, “Whoever wishes to come after Me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow Me.” We are Jesus’ disciples, and He is speaking those same words to us here and now.

Living a life of discipleship is not always easy. It requires us to be imitators of Christ — who suffered, died, and rose from the dead out of total love for each one of us. This means we are called to share in Christ’s sufferings by taking up our cross and following Him daily.

But what does this look like in our day-to-day lives?

We can start by making a firm resolution to follow Christ today, here and now, and renewing that resolution each day when we rise. This requires time with Him each day — speaking and listening.

We should also strive to pick up our crosses each day with Christ by our side. Our cross might be suffering from an illness, fighting an addiction, a day of screaming kids, or a period where things just don’t seem to go our way. Instead of avoiding these sufferings or complaining about them, we are called to carry them with Christ, allowing Him to transform us through them.

If we live life constantly focused on us, we will ultimately lose ourselves, but if we surrender our lives for Christ and His mission, we will gain eternal life and become more alive than we could have ever imagined, “For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the Gospel will save it.” This takes daily commitment and requires endurance in our faith, which can only be done through active discipleship.

cont'd from page 3... Roman custom via medieval England. Interestingly, that has not been the practice elsewhere, and parishes abroad often do carry just the name of the neighborhood. In Ireland, the Roman (English) practices didn't take hold, and so churches are known simply by the street they are on, or by a nickname. St. Francis of Assisi in Dublin is often called "Adam and Eve" after a pub in the same street. The pub sign is an interesting carving of our first parents, so they become patrons by default.

Increasingly in the United States, we are seeing a familiar European pattern emerge when a few churches, each bearing the name of a patron saint or mystery, are gathered into one parish that bears a different name. Thus, we might hear of a parish of "Midvalley City" comprised of St. Mary, St. Francis, and St. Ursula churches. Once a church has been consecrated, its name may not normally be changed. Therefore, when parishes are merged, a new name is given to the parish, which may or may not be that of a heavenly patron, but the church buildings retain their names. In the process, we have lost sight of some worthy patrons of old, but have also seen new parishes open dedicated to 20th century saints like Edith Stein, Katharine Drexel, and Mother Teresa. —James Field, Copyright © J. Is 50:5-9a | Jas 2:14-18 | Mk 8:27-35

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I think it can be easy to romanticize faith: the post-retreat high, the inspirational homily, even the motivational wall art that pops up on Pinterest. But *keeping* the faith can be hard sometimes. And living it out? Even harder. Today's readings both challenge and encourage us, as they so often do. The Letter of James pulls no punches: Faith without works is "dead." And in today's Gospel, right after Peter says, "You are the Christ," Jesus tempers that Good News, telling him that even the Son of Man must suffer greatly. We who follow Jesus must also be willing to take up our cross. This is a daily challenge to choose life over death; to choose the transformative power of Jesus over sin that creeps into our lives; to make the choice to put others' needs before our own. None of this is easy. But as the prophet Isaiah reminds us, we don't have to do it alone; indeed, the Lord God is our help. We can choose well.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'm inspired when the young people in our parish assist with the Sunday liturgy and do service projects in the community. As a working parent (and back when I was a "stay-at-home" mom), I tell myself, maybe someday when things slow down, I'll do more. But honestly, I think the teens in the youth group - between work, school, and sports - are busier than I am. As we listen to today's readings, wherever we may be in life and faith, what stands out? Is it James' entreaty to pair faith with works? Or Jesus' words that "whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it"? Or the prophet Isaiah's rock-solid faith? Today's readings give us many ways to witness to our faith in Jesus - through prayer, service, generosity, perseverance, works, and words. We can ask the Holy Spirit to show us which of these gifts we can share with others this week.

ACTIONS Brainstorm new ways to witness to your faith. It could be as simple as picking up extra food for the pantry in the back of church or changing up "Grace" at dinner to add prayers for others.

A Pointed Challenge

This Week's Readings at Mass


- ▶ Isaiah 50:4-9a - Salvation through the Lord's servant
- ▶ James 2:14-18 - Faith and good works
- ▶ Mark 8:27-35 - "Get Behind Me, Satan!"

Rather than focus on the Gospel, we will reflect on the second reading, from the Letter of Saint James. This week is the third of five consecutive weeks we hear challenging words from James.

A few decades before James wrote this letter, Paul wrote that Jews and Gentiles alike are saved by faith in Jesus Christ, not "by doing the works of the law" (Gal. 2:16). His point was that it wasn't external actions or "following the rules" that could earn someone salvation—it was faith in Christ.

Unfortunately, it seems that some Christians began using the slogan "faith over works" to justify their lack of good deeds since they saw themselves as automatically saved by their faith. James counters this kind of thinking in his letter, challenging social inequality and economic injustices among his readers. The modern equivalent of James' critique would be wishing a homeless person well or sending "thoughts and prayers" to people who are suffering without doing anything concretely to help them. "So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead," he writes (Jas. 2:17).

Paul would have agreed with him. We can't earn our salvation by good deeds, but actions should flow



from our faith. It may not be comfortable or convenient for us to interrupt our lives to provide the homeless person on the corner with a meal or warm clothes, but that is what our faith asks of us. James doesn't want his readers to forget that or excuse themselves from such obligations just because they can claim to have faith in Christ.

Questions of the Week

- 1 Do you know people who make a show of having faith although you rarely see evidence of it in action? Do you know of people who consistently do service and justice work, whether or not they have explicit faith in Jesus? Please share your experience with such people.
- 2 What are you particularly challenged to do in response to this reading?




