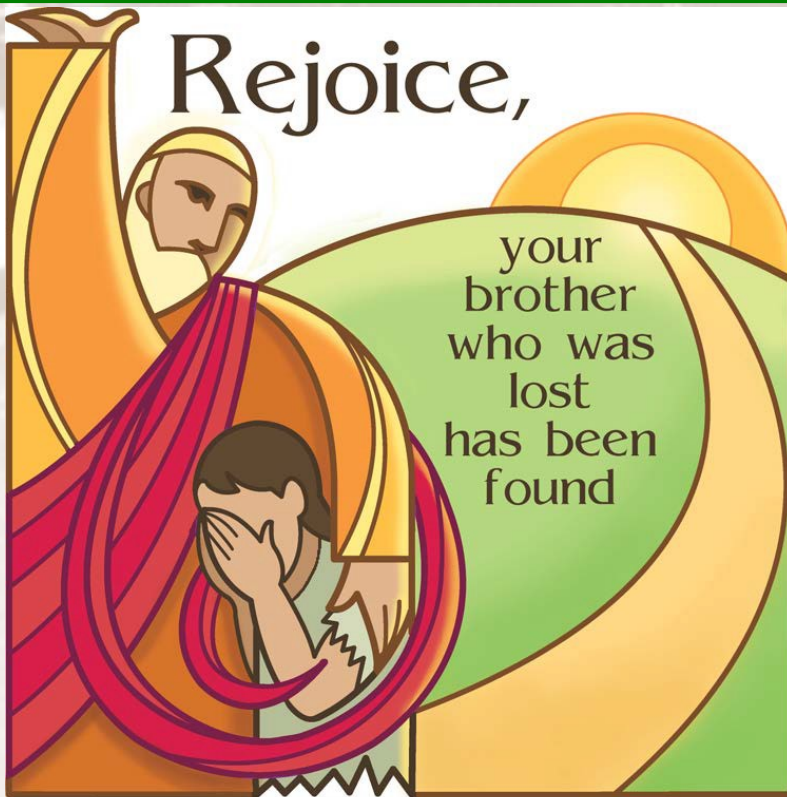

Lost And Found

Welcome to “Lost and Found Sunday”! Just in case being in church makes us proudly consider ourselves especially religious, today’s Gospel suggests that we’d be wiser to admit that we’re sometimes lost. Then we’ll eventually be happily counted among Jesus’ “found,” because today Jesus focuses on a lost sheep, lost coin, lost son.

Jesus does so because the Pharisees and scribes, proudly considering themselves especially religious, “began to complain” that Jesus “welcomes sinners and eats with them.” So Jesus warns them—and us—to stop judging others. Marvel instead that God’s amazing grace has found us! Indeed, we should become Jesus’ friends lovingly trying to find others. So Exodus asks, if God “relented in punishment” and pardoned us, shouldn’t we forgive fellow sinners graciously? Even Paul admits his “arrogance” as “foremost among sinners.” We too, happy at being “mercifully treated,” should share with everyone else Jesus’ unfailing patience.

Life of Stewardship

Today's readings focus on the personal, passionate and merciful love of God, which should fill us with unending gratitude to Him. This gratitude is the fuel that keeps the stewardship way of life rolling along.

In our Second Reading, from St. Paul's letter to Timothy, we find a grateful Paul who says of himself, "I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and arrogant, but I have been mercifully treated." St. Paul is well aware of the sins he has committed. But this does not hold him back from ministry. Rather, it makes him all the more grateful to be God's steward. How encouraging to know that this is true for us, as well. Our past sins, and even our present struggles, do not disqualify us from becoming God's grateful stewards.

Jesus gives us several poignant illustrations of His merciful love in today's Gospel reading from Luke. Let us focus on one in particular — the story of the lost sheep. He asks, "What man among you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them would not leave the ninety-nine... and go after the lost one until he finds it?"

The logical response is no one! It simply does not make sense to spend time and energy searching for one lost sheep when there are so many others to tend to. But God's logic — God's mercy — defies human logic. And who is the lost one? It is every one of us when we stray away from God through sin, great or small.

What gratitude we owe to such a personal, passionate, loving God! Just think, even our sins, once forgiven, become a source of fuel for our stewardship way of life as we reflect with deep gratitude on the powerful mercy of our Savior.

Sharing Garden

We harvested 897 pounds of fruits and vegetables that were distributed to the St. Michael and Annunciation Parish Food Pantries, and to the residents of Ulu Wini. The reduced harvest for this month was mainly due to the heavy rains the first two weeks of the month and the normal growing cycle of our plants. We enter late summer in good shape and hope to return to increased yields in early fall.

Malama Na Keiki

The Malama Na Keiki (Backpack Program) resumed with our first delivery the last week of August. Holualoa School has identified 25 students for the program. In the coming weeks the teacher and administrators will monitor their students to identify additional participants for the program. As in past years, we will provide weekend meals every other week to the school administrators to be distributed to the students. The students will receive a mix of canned goods (soups, vegetables, and meats), cereal (oatmeal and dry), milk and fruit juices, healthy snacks, and fresh fruit.

Our twice monthly distributions continue to draw big crowds of hungry people. Fortunately, due to your support, we have been able to make sure that everyone gets plenty of food.

Another Look at Abortion

* Effects of Abortion

Abortion results in the death of a child. For many mothers, abortion causes severe and long-lasting emotional, psychological, and spiritual trauma. Many women experience overwhelming guilt, shame, and grief. Other effects have also been documented: depression, withdrawal from others, eating disorders, self-punishing behaviors like "cutting," sexual dysfunction and problems with intimacy, alcohol and drug dependency, problems bonding with other or subsequent children, abortion-related nightmares, and other sleep problems.

Family relationships may suffer as the aborted child's father, grandparents or other family members experience their own guilt, grief, or loss. Even if the mother keeps her abortion secret, family members can be distressed by changes in the mother's behavior and mental or emotional health.

since picked up, and new schedules and commitments crowd us. In the background is God's call to consider the third commandment, still life-giving and binding, to make holy the Lord's Day by worship and rest. Jews see the Sabbath, Saturday, not so much as a day of worship, but as a day of rest, a day of renewing friendship with God by delighting in the beauty of creation and the joy of family and friends. It is a day for contemplating the wonder of God's creation, but not disturbing it.

For Christians in the first three centuries, the Lord's Day, Sunday, was not for rest, but worship. It was a regular workday. People met before dawn, and after Eucharist hurried off to daily routines. Today we come to Mass, but many hurry off to essential work, not a day of rest. The Lord's Day is not the Sabbath, but we can enhance Sunday's ability to transform us if we consider embracing some Sabbath values: having a family meal, going for a walk in a beautiful place, making room in our lives to open ourselves more fully to holiness of life in Christ.

The Eight Commandment

“You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor”

“Truth or truthfulness is the virtue which consists in showing oneself true in deeds and truthful in words, and guarding against duplicity, dissimulation, and hypocrisy. . . . Respect for the reputation and honor of persons forbids all detraction and calumny in word or attitude.” —CCC, nos. 2505 and 2507

The Bible teaches that God is the source of truth. Jesus not only taught the truth; He also said, I am the truth” (cf. Jn 14:6). The Hebrew word for truth, *emeth*, refers both to truth in words and truthfulness in deeds. Jesus both personalized truth and spoke nothing but the truth.

Saint of the Week—St. Januarius, Bishop & Martyr (Feast Day September 19)

An early Christian bishop, Januarius was martyred near Naples during the persecution of the Roman Emperor Diocletian. According to legend, as bishop of Benevento, he was visiting some imprisoned Christians in Pozzuli when he was arrested. The bishop and his Christian companies were condemned to death in an arena containing wild beasts—possible bears or lions—but the animals wouldn't touch them. According to one tradition, Bishop Januarius blessed a lion, after which it knelt at the bishop's feet. Januarius and his companions were thereafter beheaded.

This Italian saint is famous for the relic of his blood, which is kept at the Naples cathedral. It is believed that a woman, Eusebia, saved Januarius' blood after his martyrdom; it was an ancient Christian practice to preserve a vial of the blood of a martyr, often placed by his or her burial place in the catacombs. A phial of the dark, solid blood, believed to belong to St. Januarius, liquefies annually on three different feasts: the date commemorating his martyrdom (September 19); the date when his relics were transferred to Naples (the Saturday before the first Sunday of May); and the anniversary of a liquefaction that alleg-

edly halted the eruption of nearby Mount Vesuvius in 1631 (December 16). The liquification is considered by many faithful as a sign that the year will be protected from disasters.

Januarius, the patron saint of Naples, is also invoked against volcanic eruptions. He is also the patron saint of blood banks.

Pope Francis visited the Naples cathedral in 2015. While there, the St. Januarius's blood partially liquified. After venerating the relic of St. Januarius' blood, Pope Francis said: “The Archbishop said that the blood has liquefied partially: so the Saint loves us partially. Everyone needs a little more conversion so that he loves us more (March 21, 2015).

When Did God Begin?

This is a largely metaphysical question, which is best answered by St. Thomas Aquinas in his *Summa Theologica* (see Part I, Article 10, on eternity).

Not only did God not have a beginning, He will have no end, because God is eternal. We all have difficulty understanding this, because the nature of God is far beyond anything we can relate to: He is beyond space and time. The very nature of God is to exist. God has other attributes as well, many of which can be deduced by reasoning: God is eternal, immutable, omniscient and omnipotent.

Just for fun, try to wrap your mind around this explanation of eternity by the Angelic Doctor. (Warning! Pay very close attention.):

“I answer that, As we attain to the knowledge of simple things by way of compound things, so must we reach to the knowledge of eternity by means of time, which is nothing but the numbering of movement (that is, change by ‘before’ and ‘after.’ For since succession occurs in every movement, and one part comes after another, the fact that we reckon before and after in movement, makes us apprehend time, which is nothing else but the measure of before and after in movement. Now in a thing bereft of movement, which is always the same, there is no before or after. As therefore the idea of time consists in the numbering of before and after in movement; so likewise in the apprehension of the uniformity of what is outside of movement, consists the idea of eternity.

“Further, those things are said to be measured by time which have a beginning and an end in time, because in everything which is moved (that is changeable) there is a beginning, and there is an end. But as whatever is wholly immutable can have no succession, so it has no beginning, and no end.

“Thus eternity is known from two sources: first, because what is eternal is interminable — that is, has no beginning nor end (that is, no term either way); secondly, because eternity has no succession, being simultaneously whole.”

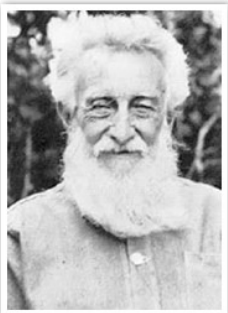

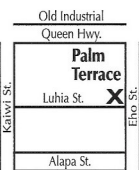
